The future: Colliding Tech and Agrictulture for Youth

Would you say that a cow named Cindy and a Nintendo switch are powerful learning tools that go hand in hand? For the first trimester of the 2024 school year. North Middle School students in Radcliff, KY got to experience a different side of Agriculture. They will be the first to tell you that, yes, agriculture can relate a cow to a Nintendo switch, even in an urban environment. They could even tell you they learned far beyond this topic.

Technology is the fastest growing asset to our youth, workforce, and personal opportunities. One area that is on a rising platform is Esports. Due to the rise in demand these iobs. for types opportunities, and interest, the youth of Hardin County deserve an opportunity to explore this potential spark and the best part is, we can incorporate ag practices.

Youth who participated were able to share all that they had learned. 80% of the youth felt like they learned leadership skills with the help of ag based lessons. New 'sparks' were explored featuring careers in agriculture; they learned about starting a business and raising livestock. When asked about growing a connection to their local community/food system they shared, "I feel more comfortable meeting new people and speaking to them" this statement also shows the growth of their communication skills. Financial discussions were also introduced as they learned the cost of various farm equipment through the use of ag Esports.



Technological awareness can be applied to ag practices such as precision-farming techniques, drones used for crop monitoring, or A.I. powered tools to lead to better farm practices. A younger demographic can be reached through their interest in gaming and technology.

For over 9 sessions 6th and 7th graders got to experience Esports featuring agriculture based games, meet local producers, and have a site visit to an agribusiness. This curriculum was all circled around 'Local Food Systems and Community' that was developed by a team at UK and designed for middle school aged youth.



BREAD IN A BAG

INGREDIENTS

2-1/2 to 3 cups all-purpose flour

- 1 envelope rapid yeast
- 3 tablespoons sugar
- 3 tablespoons nonfat dry milk
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 cup water
- 3 tablespoons vegetable oil



DIRECTIONS

- Combine 1 cup flour, undissolved yeast, sugar, dry milk, and salt in a 1-gallon, resealable heavy duty freezer bag.
- Squeeze upper part of bag to force out air. Shake and work bag with fingers to blend ingredients. Heat water and oil until very warm (120° to 130°F); add to flour mixture.
- Reseal bag; mix thoroughly by working bag with fingers.
- Gradually add enough remaining flour to make a stiff batter that pulls away from the bag.
- Remove dough from bag; knead on lightly floured surface until smooth and elastic, about 8 to 10 minutes. Cover; let rest 10 minutes.
- Roll dough to 12 x 7-inch rectangle.
- Beginning from short end, roll up tightly. Pinch seam and ends to seal.
- Place in greased 8-1/2 x 4-1/2-inch loaf pan.
- Cover; let rise in warm, draft free place until doubled in size, about 45 minutes to 1 hour.
- Bake at 375°F for 30 to 35 minutes or until done.
- Cool 5 minutes in pan. Remove from pan; cool completely on wire rack.

WASH YOUR HANDS TO STAY WELL


There are so many fun things going on this time of year — sports, school plays and musicals, and gatherings with friends and family for the holidays. You do not want to miss any of those things because of sickness! One of the best ways to stay healthy and feel good is by washing your hands to get rid of germs.

Did you know there is a "right" way to wash your hands? Follow these steps to kill germs and keep your hands clean:

- Wet your hands with clean, running water.
- Turn off the tap, and apply soap.

This chart reminds you of all the steps to wash your hands. Talk to your parent or another grown-up about where you can hang this chart to remind you and your family of all the steps to take to get rid of germs.

- Rub your hands together with the soap. Lather the backs of your hands, between your fingers, and under your nails.
- 4. Scrub your hands for at least 20 seconds. Need a timer? Hum the "Happy Birthday" song from beginning to end twice.
- 5. Rinse your hands well under clean, running water.
- 6. Dry your hands using a clean towel or an air dryer.

There are also certain times when you should wash your hands. Wash your hands at these times:

- · Before and after preparing food
- · Before and after eating food
- · After using the toilet
- · After blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing
- After touching an animal, animal feed, or animal waste
- After touching garbage
- Before and after caring for someone at home who is sick
